Activities within the LLC will provide student residents with opportunities to develop critical communication and leadership skills that we know elevates there personal career trajectories as well as the outcomes of the clients and patients that they serve.

Morocco, Medicine, & More

The College of Health Sciences and Human Services and the Office of International Programs offered students, faculty, and staff an opportunity to journey to Morocco in August. Twelve people from Clarion University took advantage of this fantastic opportunity; Six students, two faculty members (Dr. Lepore and Dr. Foster), and two staff members (Dean Allen and Dr. Naugle), and Dr. Allen's and Dr. Lepore's spouses attended.

During this trip, the participants spent most of their time in Oujda, which is the northeastern part of Morocco. This city is situated just 12 miles away from the Algerian border, which has been closed since 1994. They also traveled to the Mediterranean seaside. All throughout their trip they were able to view various landmarks, the desert, the mountains of the Middle Atlas region, and much more.

When they were not sight-seeing, students attended a course at the University of Mohammed I' School of Medicine. This school is a medical school, along with being a School of Letters and Sciences (similar to Clarion's College of Arts, Education, and Sciences). The course that students participated in was based around the North African health care practices, educational systems, and cultures. The six students who went on this trip were all in the Master of Science in Clinical Mental Health Counseling program.
