What Is Statista



Do you need authoritative statistics?

Would it help if you could present the data in a chart, graph, table, map or infographic?

<u>Statista</u> provides easy access to one of the world's largest aggregations of statistics.

This easy-to-use interface presents data in charts, maps, graphs, tables and customizable infographic forms.

- A statistics research platform covering worldwide markets, industries and societal topics
- Over 1.5 million world-wide statistics and facts along with forecasting on 500 areas from 41 countries
- More than 20,000 public and private reports
- 3,000 topic dossiers and 60 industry reports covering 600 industries
- Data compiled from 18,000 private and public sources worldwide
- All statistics and forecasts can be directly downloaded in PNG/PDF, Excel, and PowerPoint formats
- Statistics can be downloaded according to MLA, APA, Harvard, Chicago and Bluebook citation standards
- Infographics available that can be used for illustration and data visualization across all areas
- Tutorials to help you get and do what you need



Library Tip: EBSCOhost Listen

Do you learn by listening to podcasts, talking books, or other audio media?

EBSCOhost, the provider of many of our electronic journals, offers a listening option for recent full-text journal articles formatted in HTML. You can select the language and accent, then listen to it immediately (sometimes it takes a while to load) or download the file for later listening – maybe while walking or exercising.

When available, the Listen control buttons are located in the center of the full-text HTML journal article page, just above the beginning of the article.

A Google survey found that about 90% of computer users don't know about CTRL+F.

Wait. What?

CTRL+F could be one of the most useful shortcuts...ever!

Rather than reading a long list of choices, or a mound of text on a webpage for one specific thing, search for a keyword!

Hold down the "Control" key (CTRL) located on either side of the spacebar while tapping the "F" key. A "Find" box appears where you can enter the keyword of your choice. Exactly where the "find" box

appears on your screen depends on the browser you use - for instance, a box will appear at the top left of your computer screen if you use Internet Explorer, bottom left if you use Firefox, or top right if you use Chrome.

Okay. I'll admit it. CTRL+F won't help you <u>find Waldo</u>...unless his name is printed somewhere on the webpage. That's okay. You have far more important things to find than a goofy guy in red and white stripes!

sate

PRONUNCIATION:

SATE

MEANING:

To sate something (like, to sate an appetite or sate a desire) is to satisfy it completely, or to over-satisfy it.

PART OF SPEECH:

Transitive verb.

(Like "eat," "try," and "want," all transitive verbs do something to an object. You eat a banana, try a game, and want a new phone. Likewise, you sate something.)

OTHER FORMS:

sated, sating

USAGE:

Talk about sating a desire or emotion, sating your hunger or thirst, sating an appetite or craving, sating your curiosity, sating a demand for something, sating the heart or the soul, and so on. Probably the two most common phrases you'll hear and use are "to sate someone's appetite for something" and "to sate someone's hunger for something."
