### LET US FETCH THAT!



Can't find the information you need in the CU Libraries or among our many databases? Let us know and we will do all that we can to get it.

If it is a book that you are looking for and it is not in our collection, check out [E-ZBorrow](#), an interlibrary borrowing service for books. You can find a link to it in the "Services" box, under [Borrowing from Other Libraries](#) on the [Libraries](#) home page.

E-Z Borrow searches the catalogs of more than 50 other libraries, including those of large research libraries such as Pitt, Penn State, Carnegie Mellon, Penn, and Rutgers. Requested titles often arrive at Clarion within five days and you will receive an e-mail alerting you that the book is ready to pick up at the library. Clarion Online students will receive the book in the mail with a return address label to mail the book back when they are finished with it.

**Students:** Your E-Z Borrow Patron Login is 9 + your Clarion ID number. Get [help](#) determining your Clarion ID number.

**Faculty and Staff:** Your E-Z Borrow Patron Login is a series of leading zeroes followed by your employee ID number. (Use enough preceding zeroes to create a nine-digit number.) Find your employee ID number on your pay stub.

If you cannot find what you need through E-Z Borrow (or if it is an article or other type of item), please use our regular InterLibrary Loan borrowing service using ILLiad software. [ILLiad Logon](#) permits users to create a profile that eliminates repeated entry of routine information. It also allows users to track requests throughout the process. When the item arrives, you receive an email. If the item is an article or book chapter that has been scanned, you receive a Web link (good for 30 days) to view, print, or save the item. Clarion Online students will receive the book in the mail with a return address label to mail the book back when they are finished with it.

To use E-Z Borrow and ILLiad InterLibrary Loan and borrowing services, you must know your Clarion MyClarion Login and Password as well as your Student or Employee ID Number. **JSTOR** is a database of hundreds of academic journals dating back to the first issue ever published of each journal title. It includes thousands of scholarly articles digitized to make them readily available in searchable electronic form.

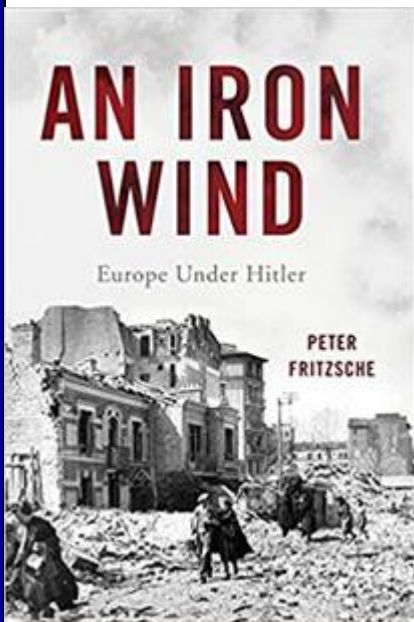
Clarion University Libraries provides access to journals in the subject areas of the arts, humanities, language and literature, social sciences, the sciences (including life science), and business. You may access JSTOR resources through the search box on the Libraries' [homepage](#).

To go *directly* to the JSTOR search engine, start at the Libraries' [homepage](#). In the "Research" block, click on Databases [A-Z](#), then scroll down the alphabetical list or use the link to jump to the "J" section of

databases.

## Carlson Library Browsing Books



***An Iron Wind: Europe Under Hitler*** by Peter Fritzsche.

Fritzsche uses diaries, letters, and other first-person accounts to reveal how ordinary civilians in Nazi-occupied Europe responded to the chaos, uncertainty, and brutality of World War II. Were they indifferent or did they resist? Did they fully comprehend Hitler's aims? How did they interact with their neighbors and how did they approach the groups that the Germans persecuted?

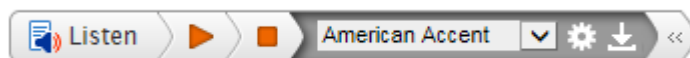
What part did religion play in lives of Jews and Christians as they attempted to understand the violence and hatred they witnessed or experienced first-hand? Fritzsche devotes a chapter to that question and concludes that, especially among the young people Hitler targeted, National Socialism "almost until the end, remained a highly relevant moral and ethical current, and an alternative to Christianity in Germany."

Not exactly a book for leisure reading, [An Iron Wind](#) can be found on Level 1 in the Carlson Library Browsing Collection, shelf location call number D802.A2 2016.

## LIBRARY TIP: EBSCOHOST LISTEN

Do you *learn by listening* to podcasts, talking books, or other audio media?

**EBSCOhost**, the provider of many of our electronic journals, offers a listening option for recent full-text journal articles that are formatted in HTML. You may select the language and accent, then listen to it immediately (sometimes it takes a while to load) or download the file for later listening – maybe while walking or exercising.



When available, the Listen control buttons are located in the center of the full-text HTML journal article page, just above the beginning of the article.

# THE S.W.A.T. MINION'S TIP: WIFI IS DANGEROUS!?



“Don’t do your online banking or anything sensitive on a public Wi-Fi network.” The advice is out there, but why can using a public Wi-Fi network actually be dangerous? Wouldn’t online banking be secure because it’s encrypted?

There are a few big problems with using a public Wi-Fi network. The open nature of the network allows for **snooping**, the network could be full of **compromised machines**, or — most worryingly — the hotspot itself could be **malicious**.

## Snooping

Encryption normally helps protect your network traffic from prying eyes. For example, even if your neighbor at home is within range of your Wi-Fi network, they cannot see the web pages you’re viewing.

This wireless traffic is encrypted between your laptop, tablet, or smartphone and your wireless router. It is encrypted with your Wi-Fi passphrase.

When you connect to an open Wi-Fi network like one at a coffee shop or airport, the network is generally unencrypted — you can tell because you do not have to enter a passphrase when connecting. Your unencrypted network traffic is then clearly visible to everyone in range. People can see what unencrypted web pages you’re visiting, what you’re typing into unencrypted web forms, and even see which encrypted websites you’re connected to — so if you’re connected to your bank’s website, they’d know it, although they wouldn’t know what you were doing.

**Protecting Yourself:** If you are accessing something sensitive on public Wi-Fi, try to do it on an encrypted website.

## Compromised Devices

Compromised laptops and other devices may also be connected to the local network, and could try to infect you.

**Protecting Yourself:** Select the *Public* network option (not work, not home options) when connecting to public Wi-Fi, keep your computer up to date (both operating system and anti-virus), and leave a firewall enabled.

## Malicious Hotspots

Most dangerously, the hotspot you connect to itself may be malicious. The business’s hotspot may be infected, or you may be connected to a honeypot network. When connecting to “Public Wi-Fi” in a public place, you cannot be entirely sure that the network is actually legitimate ... it may have been set up by an attacker in an attempt to trick people into connecting.

Is it safe to log into your bank’s website on public Wi-Fi? The question is more complicated than it appears. In theory, it should be safe because the encryption ensures you are actually connected to your bank’s website and no one can eavesdrop. In practice, there are a variety of attacks that can be performed against you on public WiFi.

**Protecting Yourself:** Don’t do online banking or access sensitive data on public Wi-Fi if possible, even if the sites are encrypted with HTTPS. If you use public Wi-Fi connections regularly, you may want to invest in a Virtual Private Network, or VPN.
