55,912 Electronic Journals!



Did you know that Clarion University Libraries provide access to 55,912 electronic journals?

These journals contain millions of articles on almost every conceivable subject.

Where do you find these journals?

If you use the search box on the <u>Library Web</u> page, the search results will include citations to articles included in these journals.

You may also access most of them by going to the <u>Library Web</u> page, finding the green "Research" box, and clicking on the <u>Journals A-Z</u> link. There you can either search for a specific title or browse the list by title or subject categories.

The <u>Databases A-Z</u> link provides information and access to all of the databases to which the Libraries subscribe. Links to the majority of the journals are available here. Two databases that include thousands of academic journals on a wide range of topics are *Academic Search Complete* and *ProQuest Direct*. Most other databases have a subject focus, which may be of interest.

Don't forget to check out the LibGuide, "<u>Databases by Subject</u>" that will direct you to databases on broad subject categories such as Business Administration, Education, Psychology, and others. Locate this LibGuide quickly by clicking its title in the green "Research" box on the <u>Libraries homepage</u>.

370,425+ E-Books!



Did you know that Clarion University Libraries provide access to more than 370,425 electronic books?

If you are looking for scholarly research materials, such as those your professors prefer their students to use, our Discovery Search Box and Primo (the online catalog of library book and media holdings) provide access to major collections of electronic books such as:

- EBSCO E-books
- Ebook Central
- Credo Reference
- Gale Virtual Reference Library
- Oxford Digital Reference Shelf

Find these - and others - through the <u>E-Book Collections</u> link in the "Research Resources" block at the Library website. Besides the books that we purchase to meet specific course and research needs, we provide links to Internet sites that provide free access to thousands of digitized books, including:

- Digital Book Index
- Internet Archive Million Book Project
- Online Books Page (Univ. of Penn.)
- Project Gutenberg
- Google Books
- Google Scholar

For information about e-book use and download options, check out our E-book LibGuide.

Did you know:

- Not all publishers will sell e-books to libraries
- Libraries can't purchase e-books from Amazon
- Some publishers withhold the availability of e-book versions until three- to six-months after the print edition is published
- Some publishers charge libraries three- to six-times the cost of a print edition
- E-books are licensed and many can only be used by one person at a time
- Some publishers limit the times an e-books can be used
- Some publishers don't permit academic libraries to enable the downloading of e-books
