Many people are "visual" learners and respond better to information delivered through film. If this sounds like you, you are in luck! Check out our streaming video service.

[Films on Demand](#) provides access to more than 7,500 educational videos, film clips, and multimedia presentations that may be helpful in meeting academic, vocational, and life-skills needs. Some of Clarion's faculty members have identified films or clips that are relevant to the courses they teach so you may find these are already included in your course syllabus.

The [Films on Demand](#) Website includes a search engine that offers access to films by title or subject. An advanced search feature enables searches by producer and date. The Website also offers access to films by broad subject categories, with additional subject subdivisions within each category. Other options include access to either an entire film or to specific subject segments. New content is added periodically, while some older content is removed. Check it out to see what's changed.

## We Know News



What's new? What's in the news? A **LibGuide** provides information on all newspapers that Carlson Library subscribes to in print or through Internet access, including archival issues. It's a rich resource to local, regional, national, and international news.

At the University [Libraries](#) Webpage, look under the "Library Help" column (the one on the right), and click the link to the [Pathfinders \(LibGuides\)](#). Select the [Newspapers and News Sources](#) link.

The guide organizes the information into three categories:

- **"Newspapers in the Library Collection"** focuses on the holdings of Carlson Library with hot links to the home pages of many of the newspapers.
- **"Pennsylvania Newspapers"** is organized by city of publication and also includes links to the home pages

of the newspapers.

- **Newspaper Databases and Websites** is the access point to newspapers from around the nation and around the world available through the EBSCO Newspaper Source, LexisNexis, and ProQuest databases. They include full text news articles from hundreds of papers and news sources (including the *Wall Street Journal (Online)*, *CBS* and *Fox News*). Also accessible in this section are *NewsVoyager* and the *Internet Public Library*, which provide links to newspaper websites throughout the world arranged geographically by continent and then country.

## Computer Tip: Windows 7 In A \*SNAP\*

“Snap” is a quick (and fun) new way to resize open windows, simply by dragging them to the edges of your screen.

Depending on where you drag a window, you can make it expand vertically, take up the entire screen, or appear side-by-side with another window.

Grab the window by clicking anywhere along the colored bar circled below:



Drag to the right, and when the cursor touches the right-hand edge of the screen, the window automatically resizes (Snaps) to the fill half the screen.

To view a second browser window next to the first one, grab

the a TAB ...

... and drag it to a clear area on the desktop:



Ta da! Two browser windows side-by-side!

When you drag a window to the top of the screen, the window resizes (in a SNAP) to FILL the entire screen. Drag it down a little and it goes back to the original size.
