**MLA** (Modern Language Association) style is most commonly used to write papers and cite sources within the *liberal arts and humanities*.

**APA** (American Psychological Association) is most commonly used to cite sources within the *social sciences*.

Come learn the basic elements that are necessary for you to create your Works Cited page or References page for your research paper.

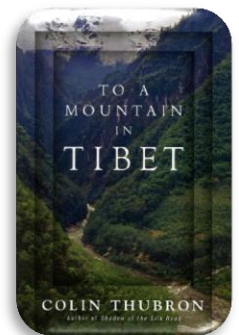

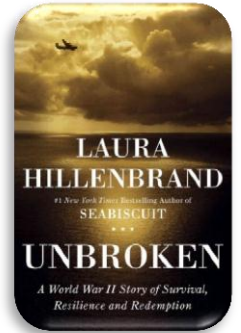

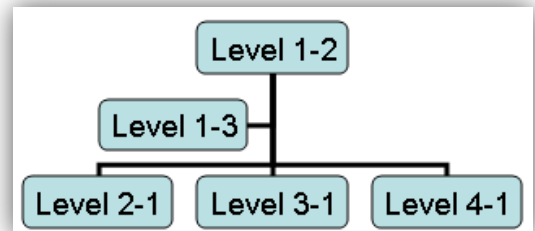

1. From the Diagram Gallery window select:

- Organizational Chart  
(shown)
- Cycle Diagram
- Radial Diagram
- Pyramid Diagram
- Venn Diagram
- Target Diagram



2. Select **Insert** on the menu bar then click  **Diagram...**
3. Fill in the blanks to create a professional organizational chart or diagram.
