If it is a book that you are looking for and it is not in our collection, check out <u>E-ZBorrow</u>, an interlibrary borrowing service for books. You can find it under the "Library Services" column on the <u>Libraries'</u> home page.

Dr. Terry Latour Dean of Libraries Penn State, and Carnegie Mellon. Requested titles often arrive at Clarion University Libraries within five days and you will receive an e-mail alerting you that the book is ready to pick up at the library.

If you cannot find a book through E-Z Borrow - or if it is an article or other type of item -, please use our regular InterLibrary Loan borrowing service that uses ILLiad software to facilitate the process.

<u>ILLiad</u> permits users to create a profile that eliminates repeated entry of routine information. It also allows the user to track requests throughout the entire process. When the item arrives, you are notified via email. If the item is an article or book chapter that has been scanned, you are provided with a Web link to view, print, or save the item for up to 30 days.

To use E-Z Borrow and ILLiad InterLibrary Loan and borrowing services, you need to know your Clarion iPortal Login and Password as well as your Student or Employee ID Number.

Library Tip: Electronic Journals



Did you know that you have access to about 25,000 magazines, journals, newspapers, and reports through library databases? The full text of the articles in these publications is available through

dozens of electronic databases that the library subscribes to. You may locate what you need in several ways.

Begin by going to the library Web page at: www.clarion.edu/library and clicking on the <u>Journals/Magazines A-Z</u> link. You can either search for a specific title or browse the list by title or subject categories.

The <u>Databases A-Z</u> link provides information on all the databases to which the library subscribes. Two databases that include thousands of academic journals are *Academic Search Complete* and *ProQuest Direct*. Most other databases have a theme or subject focus.

Computer Tip: Flash Drive Defragging?



Should you "defrag" your USB/Flash Drive? The short answer is an emphatic "NO! You should never defrag a flash drive." It is recommended that you defrag your computer's hard drive periodically to help improve performance. So why

not do the same thing to a Flash Drive?

The files you have stored on your hard drive are often saved in several little pieces, often in groups of 512 bytes. Those chunks of data are usually spread out across the physical hard drive, which is why defragging is so important.

The whole defrag process is done through a read/write head that rearranges your files and places them back together. That way, when you need to access a certain file, your computer does not have to work as hard to find what you are looking for. That is why it is recommended to defrag on a regular basis (once a month or so).

On the other hand, flash drives do not have a read/write head, so if you defrag it, you will not get any extra performance benefits from it whatsoever. Without a read/write head, flash drives do not have to work any harder to find your files.

Another reason to never defrag a flash drive is because flash memory wears out over time. The more you write (saving files, etc.) to your flash drive, the shorter its lifespan will be. Since defragging is a huge write process, every time you do it, you're adding thousands of extra writes to your device that just aren't necessary.
